Mary Walker was an American abolitionist and Civil War surgeon. When she was at Stafford's Chatham she did not use her surgery skills but instead was asked to place dressings on the wounded after the Battle of Fredericksburg and prepare them for the trip to hospitals in D.C. # Parkinson's Disease

Rich Gaudio graduated with a BS and an MS in Physical Therapy from SUNY Upstate Syracuse. After graduation Rich moved to Fredericksburg and has been practicing in the realm of rehabilitation ever since. Parkinson disease is the third leading degenerative, progressive, neurological disorder affecting adults in the US. Approximately 10 million people around the world and 1 million people in the US are currently diagnosed. An additional 60,000 people are diagnosed every year in the US. It has a ratio of 1.5 to 1, male to female and an average age of onset of 68 years old. This disease costs the US almost \$25 billion per year in healthcare costs. The reality is, despite there being no cure, the disease is very manageable and there are several programs in the US that are improving how people manage Parkinson's Disease. What we have learned about these interventions has had a profound impact on our aging population, even if they do not have Parkinson's Disease.
