


High-impact learning refers to the teaching and learning practices that the Association of American Colleges and Universities considers most beneficial because they best engage and challenge students, increase retention, and contribute to cumulative learning.



#### 1. Contextualized

It's important that any learning experience be put into its proper context. You might call this "seeing the bigger picture."





#### 2. Relevant

Students are most interested in learning subjects that have immediate relevance to their work and/or personal lives.





#### 3. Problem-Based

Whenever possible, it's best to structure learning around a real scenario that the students might encounter.





#### 4. Learn By Doing

As with the previous principle, we find that students taking an active role rather than passive role makes for a higher quality learning experience.





5. Social

Develop a learning community – a group of enthusiastic people coming together to add to their skillsets, network with like-minded professionals, and socialize.





#### 6. Self-Directed

This last principle is arguably the most important aspect of a high impact learning experience:

empowering students to feel like they're setting their own direction.

- Small classes

Often cultivated within departments or major programs

Managed through the Center for Career and Professional Development (CCPD)





2000 – Career Services office (director and about 3 staff)

2013 – merge with Academic Services to provide more holistic approach to advising

2017 – creation of the Office of Career and Professional Development







Our new communication program alone sponsored 33 internships last year.

Psychology now has a 'course' that student interns sign up for, just to manage all of the activity.

1995 - International Academic Services

Led by one part-time person with assistant

2004 – new director takes over

- Starts to become more of a professional enterprise
- Full-time position with two part-time staff
- Increased number of faculty-led programs






#### 2010 - Center for International Education

**Study Abroad:** by type (2018-2019)

- o Faculty-led programs: 145 (52% of total)
- Exchange programs: 8
- Approved programs (Direct Enrollment or Provider): 52




#### Study Abroad: by type (2018-2019)

- Internship programs: 10 (internships that take place in a foreign country)
- Eagles Abroad: 48 (e.g., Athletes or philharmonic. They travel to play or perform.)
- Volunteer Abroad: 4 (Global Brigades students raise money to go to a destination abroad to serve.)
- Undergraduate Research Abroad: 2





#### Study Abroad: total participation, 2014-2019



#### 2018-2019 Interesting Stats:

- 69% Female
- 14% First in Family
- Top Destinations: Panama, Costa Rica, France, Italy, Spain
- Top Majors: BIO, BUAD, INAF, Undeclared, PSYC
- 78% White
- 54% Seniors (primarily on Faculty-led short-term programs)
- GPA Avg. = 3.18




When students participate in research project, they translate what they learned in the classroom to a real setting where they can actually contribute to a body of knowledge.












# Students can apply for money to support their projects:

- Travel to professional meetings








#### UR: the Summer Science Institute

- 10 week summer research program
- Teams of 3: 1 faculty member
   + 2 students
- Students receive
  - On-campus housing
  - Meals
  - Stipend
- Faculty receive a stipend







#### UR: the Summer Science Institute

This past summer, students worked with faculty on a variety of projects, including environmental issues related to climate change, mathematical models, faster ways to run computer programs simultaneously, and biological models of diseases. Several of these projects were adapted by faculty in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, as all research is being done remotely.

A big part of the UR budget is used to send students to do field work.








#### UR: conference participation

"I feel as though my dreams of working in New York City are not as far away as I once thought."


